<b>Program Application Income Guidelines</b>	Dates vary. Students apply once enrolled at the college campus. Full-time status (12 sem. units) is generally required.	Dates vary. Students must apply <b>prior to their first semester of study</b> at SDSU. Full-time status (12 sem. units) is generally required. EOP Income <a href="#">Guidelines</a>
<b>Application Deadline</b>	Dates Vary.	Check published deadlines. Submit EOP application <i>concurrently</i> with the SDSU Undergraduate Admission Application at <a href="http://www2.calstate.edu/apply">www2.calstate.edu/apply</a> .
<b>New Student Orientation</b>	Yes. Mandatory. Free.	Yes, 'First Contact' is a one-day, mandatory free orientation scheduled in June.
<b>Priority Registration</b>	Yes.	No (EOP priority registration was possible prior to Fall 2006. Students can register early by completing SDSU's summer New Student Orientation.
<b>Book Vouchers</b>	Yes. Amounts and policies range depending on budget/number of participants.	No. The SDSU Bookstore offers EOP participants a 10% discount.
<b>EOPS Grants</b>	Yes. Awarded to eligible participants; amounts range.	Yes. Award is contingent upon EFC, FA factors, on-campus housing, etc. Some EOP participants may receive a Tuition Fee Waiver in lieu of an EOP grant.
<b>Academic Tutoring</b>	Yes. Tutorial services are generally referred to established campus support programs/departments.	Yes. The EOP <b>Learning Support Center (LSC)</b> provides on-site academic tutoring by request beginning three weeks into the semester.
<b>Counseling</b>	Yes. Three required academic counseling contacts per semester. Participants max out of program at 70-degree applicable units of college credits.	Yes, two required academic counseling contacts per term. Participants receive services until graduation.
<b>Computer Lab</b>	No. Students use existing on-campus services.	Yes. A small computer lab, discounted printing services, a quiet lounge area and free Wi-Fi are available inside the EOP office.
<b>Day care</b>	Provide meal vouchers, referrals and transportation support for eligible CARE participants.	No.
<b>Student Enrichment Activities</b>	EOPS/CARE clubs, student success workshops, and enrichment activities vary by program.	EOP Student Advisory Board (ESAB) Student success workshops throughout the academic year, usually coordinated by the LSC or in cooperation w/ other departments.
<b>Summer Transition Programs</b>	Yes. Several campuses provide a summer transition experience for FTF. SIP (Summer Immersion/Summer Readiness, etc.) Students served and program duration varies by institution.	<b>Transfer Bridge Program (TBP)</b> Up to 100 participants, a one-week intensive program in late July. Must be EOP admitted. Participants apply to TBP after EOP admissions notice.
<b>Dream Act</b>	Support services vary by campus. Some campuses have student organizations (e.g., Scholars without Borders, Futuros, Dreamers Movement Club, etc.)	The Undocumented Resource Area (URA) opened Spring 2017. Education without Borders (EWB) is a DREAM student organization founded in 2011 by faculty and graduate students in the School of Sociology and EOP staff.
<b>Foster Youth</b>	Yes. CAFYES/Guardian Scholars/NextUp. Services vary by campus; book vouchers, meal cards, transportation expenses support, counseling.	Yes. Guardian Scholars. Dedicated support and academic services; scholarships; on-campus housing for eligible participants based on program cap.
<b>Other</b>	Additional support depending on program participation, funding and student eligibility including; book voucher, meal voucher, transportation pass, emergency book loan, gas card, etc.	On-campus referrals. CalFresh, Psychological Services and Financial Aid advising available for EOP students inside the EOP office. Student success seminars and events.
